## **Call for Presentations**

### **Share Your Knowledge**

Submit an abstract for a paper presentation that covers GIS/GPS topics of interest. Authors will present in a 20 to 30 minute live presentation as part of a moderated session. Abstracts will also be published as part of the conference proceedings.

### **Submission Guidelines**

- Your abstract must be in electronic format, may not exceed 1 MB, and cannot be longer than 150 words.
- At no time is it permissible for a paper presenter to use his/her time slot to advertise or promote a product, service, or company.
- Do not write in all CAPITAL LETTERS. Remember, the information you enter is used for publishing purposes (e.g., Web site, agenda, CD-ROM).
- All Paper Submissions must be in electronic format and presentations must be in English.
- No bullet points or numbering should be used.

### **Submissions should include**

Author/Presenter name(s)  
Presentation title with brief abstract (as noted above)  
Company name  
Complete address and phone  
Presenter biography

### **Important Information**

All papers and presentations must be noncommercial. Proceedings will be published on the event Web site. This year's committee will evaluate all abstracts and make selections based on topic, content, and time available. All authors will be notified after the selection process. A detailed program of presentations and events will be provided prior to the conference. Projector equipment will be provided. Please bring your laptop. There are a limited number of presentation slots available. We cannot guarantee that all submissions will be accepted.
